## Issues related to student equity impact your practice as an educator.

Education has the power to shape a child's future. The quality of education that a student receives influences the quality of life experienced later in life. Knowing that there is/was more than one way to handle situations, as well understanding that one way might work one time and not necessarily another, contributed to additional problem solving and solutions.

The biggest takeaway for students, that became a driving force, was the understanding that creating labels, placing people in categories, was something that fostered divisions and did not promote unity. Students were able to utilize this in everyday situations, as well as apply to many of the topics they learned about.
